△ **Durbar Square, Kathmandu**. Slowly recovering from damage wrought by the 2015 earthquake, this crowded Malla-era cityscape is still a living, breathing place of worship and commerce. See page 163.

Swayambhunath. Standing atop a monkeyinfested hill, this great white stupa has been
watching out over Kathmandu for millennia; its
courtyard, bedecked with prayer flags and crowded
with statuary, still offers the ultimate view of the

△ **Boudhanath**. Set amidst the crowded spaces on the eastern edge of Kathmandu, this magnificent Buddhist monument is the hub of a thriving Tibetan community, with monks, monasteries and momos aplenty. See page 174.



△ **Bhaktapur**. Of all the medieval temple towns of the Kathmandu Valley, Bhaktapur feels furthest removed from the modern world. The beetling alleys are free from traffic, and around every other corner lies another temple-filled square. See page 185.



△ The Kathmandu Valley. Ringed with high hills and studded with spectacular temples, the Kathmandu Valley offers endless opportunities for exploration, from the alleys of Sankhu to the forests of Shivapuri and the epic mountain views from Nagarkot and Dhulikhel. See page 197.

VIEWING WILDLIFE

Chitwan National Park.

Deep in the forests of southern Nepal, Chitwan is one of Asia's great national parks, home to tigers, rhinos, bears and crocodiles. See page 290.

Bardia National Park. In the remote western
Terai, this park is home

to tigers and wild elephants and all manner of exotic birdlife. See page 297.

Koshi Tappu Wildlife Reserve. In the eastern Terai, this beautiful riverine reserve is remarkably rich in birdlife, and forms a major staging post for migrant species. See page 286.

Langtang National Park.
Red pandas thrive in the dense bamboo groves of this beautiful mountain region, which is also home to elusive upland ungulates and a handful of snow leopards. See page 245.

Shey-Phoksundo National Park. This vast and fabled mountain park is home to blue sheep, wolves and the majestic and ghostly snow leopard. See page 306.

BEST TEMPLES AND RELIGIOUS SITES

Pashupatinath. On the banks of the Bagmati River, the smoking funeral pyres and meditating sadhus instil this sacred spot with a profound atmosphere. See page 175.



and is still a major place of pilgrimage. See page 201.

Dakshinkali. Set in the cool forests in the furthest southern reaches of the Kathmandu Valley, this tiny temple is the scene of spectacular blood sacrifices, demonstrating the depth of religious faith in Nepal. See page 207.

Janaki Mandir. Far from the beaten tourist track in the Terai town of Janakpur, this magnificent Mughalstyle temple is dedicated to Sita, wife of the god Rama. See page 287.
