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DOCTOR WHO

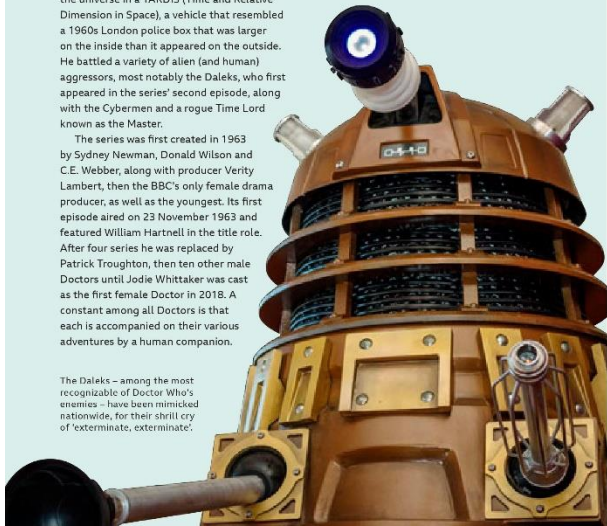
The longest-running science-fiction television series centres on an extra-terrestrial time-traveller capable of regeneration. The series takes us into the past and future, journeys through galaxies and across countless planets. But through it all, the Doctor not only appears to prefer humanity above all other species, they have a singular and timeless fascination with the notion of Britishness.

The Doctor was from the planet Gallifrey, the home to the Time Lords, and travelled the universe in a TARDIS (Time and Relative Dimension in Space), a vehicle that resembled a 1960s London police box that was larger on the inside than it appeared on the outside. He battled a variety of alien (and human) aggressors, most notably the Daleks, who first appeared in the series' second episode, along with the Cybermen and a rogue Time Lord known as the Master.

The series was first created in 1963 by Sydney Newman, Donald Wilson and C.E. Webber, along with producer Verity Lambert, then the BBC's only female drama producer, as well as the youngest. Its first episode aired on 23 November 1963 and featured William Hartnell in the title role. After four series he was replaced by Patrick Troughton, then ten other male Doctors until Jodie Whittaker was cast as the first female Doctor in 2018. A constant among all Doctors is that each is accompanied on their various adventures by a human companion.

The Daleks – among the most recognizable of Doctor Who's enemies – have been mimicked nationwide, for their shrill cry of 'exterminate, exterminate'.

The initial run of Doctors was from 1963 to 1989, when the series was cancelled due to declining popularity. An unsuccessful attempt to revive the show was made in 1996, before it was successfully regenerated, with Russell T. Davies at the helm, in 2005. Like the series' protagonist, the theme music, created by the innovative BBC Radiophonic Workshop, has undergone a number of mutations, but at its core remains the same piece that first introduced the Doctor to our world.

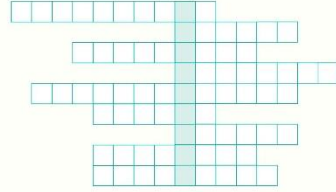


HIDDEN VILLAIN

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DESERT ISLAND DISCS

Opening to the relaxing strains of composer Eric Coates' 'By the Sleepy Lagoon', *Desert Island Discs* has remained a mainstay of British radio and popular culture for 80 years. It is second only to the 'Grand Ole Opry' in the United States as the longest-running radio programme in the world.

A simple but remarkably effective interview format, the show imagines its guest on a desert island. They talk about their life as they name their eight chosen music tracks. At the end, they are accompanied on the island by a religious text, the works of William Shakespeare, a book and a 'luxury' of their choice, along with their favourite of the eight tracks.

The show was devised by Roy Plomley in 1941 after he and his wife were forced to return to England from France following the invasion of the German army. His first guest was actor and radio comedian Vic Oliver, and the show aired on 19 January 1942. Originally running for eight weekly shows, its popularity saw the BBC commission a further 15 shows.

In total, Plomley presented 1,791 editions before leaving the show in 1985. He was succeeded by Michael Parkinson, who hosted until 1988 before Sue Lawley took over and remained as host until 2006. She was replaced by Kirsty Young, who remained until 2018, when Lauren Laverne took over.

The addition of a choice of luxury and books was introduced in 1952, followed by a favourite track in 1959. By the time the show reached its 80th anniversary in 2022, it had aired more than 3,250 episodes.
